Make a call through your Favorites list If you want to call someone who isn't in your Favorites list, tap the Phone app on your Apple Watch and turn the Digital Crown knobs, or swipe to the contact you want to call. You can also ask Siri to make a phone call by saying Call and name someone in your contact list. Siri will put a phone on you. Phone. connecting via the Phone app and Siri Talking on your Apple Watch at first seems a bit strange and you might want to avoid it publicly just because it can be hard to hear someone from your Apple Watch speaker when there's ambient noise. When they have a recording in the file of their voice saying yes, fraudsters can then use it to authorize unwanted charges on bills, credit cards and more. You say yes, it gets recorded and they say they agreed to something. Susan Grant, director of consumer protection for the Consumer Federation of America, told CBS News. The caller can also ask you to press the button to be placed in the register not to call, which is just a way for scammers to find out if the number they called is active. Bottom line: So don't say anything and don't press any buttons - just disconnect! For example, here are some ways scammers might get you to say: Can you hear me? Are you the lady of the house? Do you pay the household phone bill? Do you pay your household bills? Do you own the house? You should be skeptical of any yes or no question that does not have the context provided by the caller. The safest thing to do is just hang. What scammers can do with a recording of you saying yes How scammers can cause harm, do not provide a credit card number or other information over the phone? They have your phone number and you say yes, which is often all you need to get your phone provider to go through third-party charges. In addition, fraudsters may have already personal data as a result of another type of data breach. For example, they may have your cable bill or credit card number, and then when you dispute the fees, they may counteract that they have registered consent. If you think you may have already fallen victim to this scam, check all the statements line by line - including your check account, credit card, cable bill, phone bill, utility bill and any other bills or account that contains your personal and/or payment information. If you see any charges you don't recognize, call your billing company immediately and complete your transactions. Also call your bank to make sure they are aware of what is happening. If you want to register your phone number in the government register for not call, you can do so DoNotCall.gov. But while this may stop real telemarketers and companies from asking, it won't stop scammers. So if you are already on the list and the caller gives you the opportunity to register for him, you will know that he is a scammer at the other end of the line. Tips from BBB to protect yourself from this scam: Use caller ID to screen calls, and you should not even respond to unknown numbers. If this is important, they will leave a message and you can call back. If someone calls and asks Can you hear me?, don't answer yes. Just disconnect. Fraudsters change tactics when society catches up, so be vigilant about other questions designed to give a simple answer like this. Make a note of the number bbb.org/scamtracker report it to warn others. BBB also provides Scam Tracker information with government and law enforcement agencies, so any information is helpful in tracking down scammers. Consider joining the Do Not Call (DoNotCall.gov) registry to limit the number of telemarketing and sales calls. This may not help scammers because they don't bother to pay attention to the law, but you'll get fewer calls overall. This can help you notice more quickly those that may be fake. Check your bank statements and credit cards regularly for unauthorized charges. It's also a good idea to check your phone and cell phone bills as well. Scammers can use the Yes of Your Voice recording to authorize charges on your phone. It's called tinging and it's illegal. You can also sign up for a free service that blocks call scams: Here's one that blocks IRS phone scams and another option is Nomorobo, which blocks robocalls and other chatting telemarketers. So, to protect yourself and avoid getting caught on guard, keep these tips in mind: Don't put pressure on quick decisions. some time to research the organization.
